The Conference Offers Something for Everyone

For Public Health Practitioners, Environmental Health Officials and Children's Health Clinicians, the conference will examine new findings in the environmental health field; the need to close the gap between research findings and the promulgation of public policies; available resources on children's health and the environment; ways to increase lead screening; non-housing sources of lead poisoning; case management techniques; and, protocols for conducting an environmental investigation as part of a home visit.

For Health Educators, Community Organizers and Children's Health Advocates, the conference will examine communication techniques for reaching diverse audiences; ways to use education and outreach for primary prevention; what makes up successful education and outreach programs; collaboration between public agencies and community groups; parents as advocates and educators; how to evaluate educational and outreach programs.

For Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes Program Administrators, the conference will examine primary prevention strategies in housing, schools and day care facilities; low-cost lead hazard control methods; how to conduct an environmental assessment; the anatomy of a Healthy Homes program; funding opportunities; update on state and federal legislative efforts that can impact on the future of lead hazard control and healthy homes programs; and, grant application and management issues.

For Lead, Mold and IAQ Industry Practitioners, Facility Managers, Maintenance Supervisors, and Housing Rehab Specialists, the conference will examine ways to prevent, assess and remediate mold problems in building systems and components; how to incorporate mold control in an O&M program; worker health and safety requirements for mold projects; how to market environmental services and develop business opportunities; how to obtain cost-effective environmental insurances; and, what's new in hazard remediation technologies.

Every effort is made to assure that the presenters are those whose skills and experiences demonstrate a high level of success and who can contribute to the attendees' ability to hone their professional skills and improve their day-to-day work practices.

Presenters in the Program Track on Lead and Healthy Homes Grant Management, Successful Program Implementation and Evaluation come from local government agencies, community organizations, non-profit groups and private consulting firms who have demonstrated successful track records in the development and implementation of Lead Hazard Control programs, Healthy Homes programs, Lead Elimination Action Programs, and Lead and Healthy Homes Demonstration grants, and in the design and submission of grant applications.

Presenters in the Program Track on Eliminating Childhood Lead Poisoning and Conducting Healthy Homes Programs come from public health departments, housing and community development agencies, research institutions, health educators, community organizations and parents who have undertaken lead screening programs, primary prevention programs, community education and outreach activities, and asthma intervention programs.

Consultation Roundtables

Attendees will participate in a series of Consultation Roundtables at which they will meet with subject matter experts to discuss key issues in grant management, lead poisoning prevention, indoor environmental health and hazards remediation.

What New Opportunities and Challenges Face Public Agencies, Community Organizations, Private Industry, Facility Managers and Owners, and Educational Institutions as HUD, EPA, CDC and USDA Pursue the "Framework for Healthy Housing"?

In September 2008 in Baltimore, these federal agencies conducted an exciting and visionary conference on "Building A Framework For Healthy Housing". That conference focused attention on the need to provide safe, healthy and efficient homes for America's families and reflected the federal commitment to lay the foundation to achieve their healthy homes agenda.

The New Orleans conference will strive to advance the challenge of developing a national strategy for making our nation's homes and buildings healthy places to live and work through innovative programs, public/private collaborations and local/state/federal partnerships.

The New Orleans conference will provide an exciting educational and networking opportunity by bringing together a cross section of public officials, educators, facility operators, industry practitioners, and program advocates to engage in problem-solving sessions designed to help attendees strengthen their abilities to participate in the movement towards healthy and safer living and working environments.

The New Orleans conference will examine HUD's draft "Healthy Homes Strategic Plan" so grantees and potential grantees can gain a better understanding of its relationship to local program operations, and engage in the strategic planning process by offering suggestions that can help shape the final plan.

On Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning, the conference will focus on Healthy Housing and Healthy Building issues, such as:

Technical Assistance Workshop for Grantees on the Technical Aspects of Grant Implementation from Intake to Closeout

Part 1 of this workshop examines ways for grantees to reduce and/or eliminate problems and obstacles in grant implementation, how to stay on target with benchmarks and deliverables, and how to increase the probability of a successful grant program. Part 2 covers inspections, risk assessments, clearance examinations and other technical issues including ways to build a contractor base and partnerships in the community.

Workshop on Child Lead Screening Strategies

This workshop is based on a five-city project funded by EPA to increase screening of at-risk children ages six months to six years by using "opportunistic" screening strategies aimed primarily at engaging child care facilities and WIC Centers.

Workshop on Healthy Homes Assessment and Remediation Protocols

The workshop covers the content and use of a pre-assessment instrument for evaluating household conditions and needs, the design and use of an environmental assessment tool, and Healthy Home remediation and clearance protocols.

Workshop on Inspection and Clearance Protocols, and Low Cost Lead Hazard Control and Abatement Methods

This workshop provides instruction, demonstration and discussions of lead hazard inspection and project clearance protocols, and low cost lead hazard control measures.

Plenary Sessions

The joint conference includes two plenary sessions that provide attendees the opportunity to hear from federal government officials and leaders in the childhood lead poisoning prevention and healthy housing fields.

Wednesday morning's plenary session will feature a town hall forum on "The Immediate Future of the Healthy and Safe Housing Movement." This session will include presentations on the role of the National Safe and Healthy Housing Coalition, the work of the federal government's interagency Healthy Homes working group headed by HUD, the opportunities represented by the Green and Healthy Housing Initiative, and current legislative initiatives in support of healthy and safe housing.

The session will also include a provocative presentation by Mel Chin who originated the Fundred Dollar Bill Project to draw attention to and develop solutions for the environmentally responsible rebuilding of New Orleans from the ground up.

Part of the session will be presentations of the annual Lead Star Awards and Healthy Housing Awards.

Friday morning's plenary session will provide attendees with the opportunity to hear from representatives of organizations that have been part of the post-Katrina rebuilding effort; to learn how their work and what they've experienced can provide "lessons learned" to other communities when faced with environmental, housing and health issues.

Special Session on the EPA Renovation, Repair and Painting Rule

On Thursday afternoon, the conference will feature a special session on the RRP Rule that will include presentations and discussions on the status of the Rule and its various requirements and deadlines; changes to the Rule in light of the settlement between EPA and public policy and advocacy organizations; ways in which various states are strengthening the Rule; how local government agencies are planning on enforcing the Rule; issues pertaining to

the structure of training programs for certifying contractors; and, the impact of the Rule on the remodeling and painting companies.

This session will provide attendees with updated information and the opportunity to interact with representatives from EPA, public advocacy organizations, enforcing agencies and private industry.

“How To” Workshops

The conference program features a variety of technical assistance workshops providing “how to” information on Healthy Homes issues, lead poisoning prevention and lead hazard control issues, indoor environmental hazard identification and remediation issues, education and outreach issues, and grant management issues...including the following.

How to expand from lead poisoning prevention and lead hazard control programs to healthy homes programs

The goal of this workshop is to explore options, procedures and obstacles encountered at the local level when expanding from lead poisoning prevention and lead hazard control programs to a holistic Healthy Homes program. The workshop will examine education and outreach strategies, staff training requirements, funding opportunities, goal setting, and how to engage the political community and the public at-large.

How to conduct a Healthy Homes inspection

This workshop will include a step by step process on how to conduct a Healthy Homes inspection. Topics will include lead, asthma and allergens, mold, insects and rodents, moisture incursion, noise, asbestos, radon, sewage backup and indoor air quality. The workshop is designed to instruct participants in how to recognize "red flags" that may lead to unhealthy homes and to be able to recommend further in-depth inspections of selected Healthy Homes issues if necessary.

How to implement an integrated pest management and bed bug eradication program

This session will outline the process used by the very successful “IPM in Multi-family Housing” workshops to build effective IPM programs that involve all the stakeholders: building management, facilities & maintenance staff, residents and pest management professionals. Current best-practices on bedbugs will be reported and new resources will be available.

How to integrate lead hazard control and healthy housing measures with weatherization measures

Weatherization, healthy homes and lead hazard control are a natural fit, especially now that significant Federal funding has been directed to improving the quality of low-income housing. The workshop will examine how weatherization work can be accomplished in conjunction with Healthy Homes and lead hazard control projects. The workshop will also cover the components of a workforce development training program that prepares individuals for undertaking weatherization/renovation/lead hazard control projects.

Innovated strategies to reduce lead paint hazards in housing and prevent childhood lead poisoning

This session will describe innovative primary prevention programs designed to reduce lead paint hazards in housing in order to prevent childhood lead poisoning. The session will feature presentations from local agencies and will cover key program elements, collaborations with key partners, and challenges and successes.

How to develop strategies for effective state/local lead law enforcement

This workshop will examine ways to build strong partnerships with other local agencies, and will focus on a variety of different ideas and models for building an effective enforcement strategy. Aspects of the workshop will cover working collaboratively with health agencies to screen homes and not just children.

Lessons Learned: How to reduce and/or eliminate problems and obstacles in grant implementation, and how to increase the probability of a successful grant program

This workshop will identify areas of concern in grant management, examine how to reduce and/or eliminate problems associated with grant administration, how to handle relocation issues, how to stay on target with benchmarks and deliverable, and how to build partnerships in the community.

How to manage the technical aspects of a Lead Hazard Control grant program

This workshop will cover inspections, risk assessments, clearance examinations and lead hazard control issues; training issues and needs; ways to build a contractor base; how to integrate lead hazard control work with other local agencies and programs.

How to convey health messages and promote Healthy Homes programs among hard-to-reach, at-risk populations including refugee families

Kunama, Kirundi, Karen, Bhutanese----Who are these people?! This is just a sample of the diverse groups of refugees coming to the United States every year. Sadly, in addition to challenges they pose for Healthy Homes professionals, the CDC has documented that they are as much as fourteen times more likely than U.S.-born children to be lead poisoned. They are also no strangers to household pests most low-income renters face in the U.S. Come to this session to learn how the refugee resettlement system works, hear about proven collaborative strategies to work with these hard-to-serve populations, and steps you can take to ensure that refugees understand home-based environmental hazards and are empowered to improve the quality of their housing.

How to increase screening among at-risk populations

This workshop will cover successful strategies for increasing the screening of children for lead poisoning, particularly children from high-risk population groups. It will examine outreach and education components of the screening program and the results achieved.

10 easy steps to a healthy home: where to start and how to conduct an effective outreach program

This workshop will include a step-by-step process on how to educate and empower individuals to take the first steps toward creating their own healthy homes. The workshop is designed to provide information how to develop an effective outreach to the general public using simple, yet valuable steps that every homeowner can and should easily implement. Topics will include air quality, water quality, electromagnetics, chemicals, particulates and moisture.

How to undertake green housing initiatives within a healthy housing program

The workshop will provide information on the compatibility between green and healthy housing measures, and ways that a local community can implement a green and healthy housing initiative by engaging public agencies and community-based organizations, and by utilizing public and private resources.

EXHIBIT HALL FLOOR PLAN

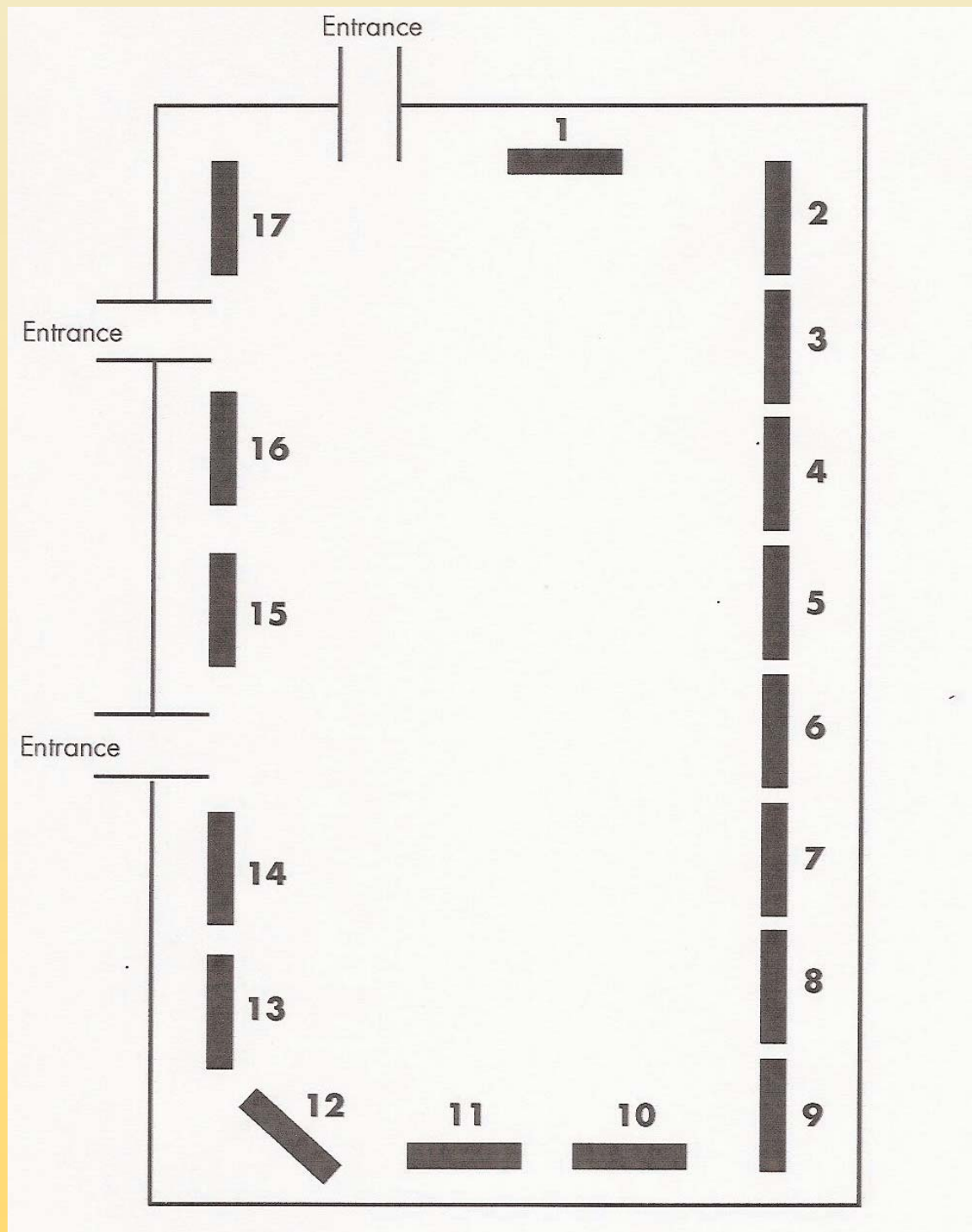

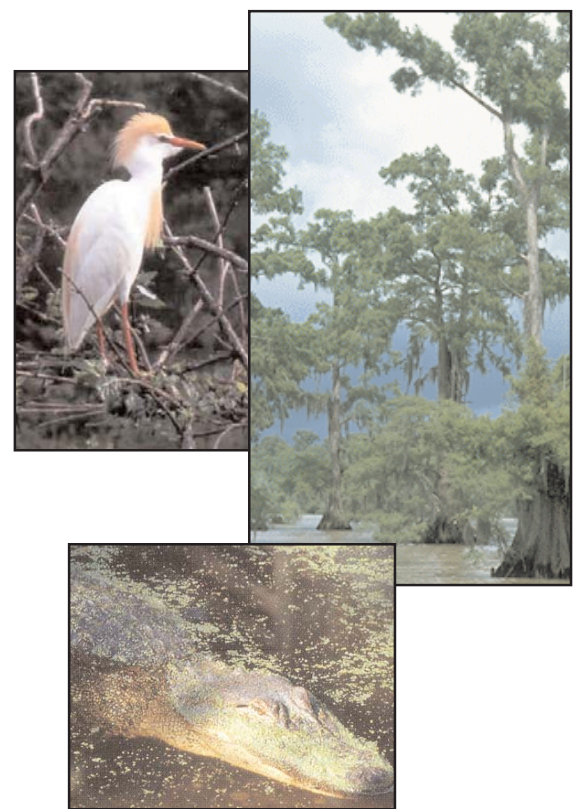
